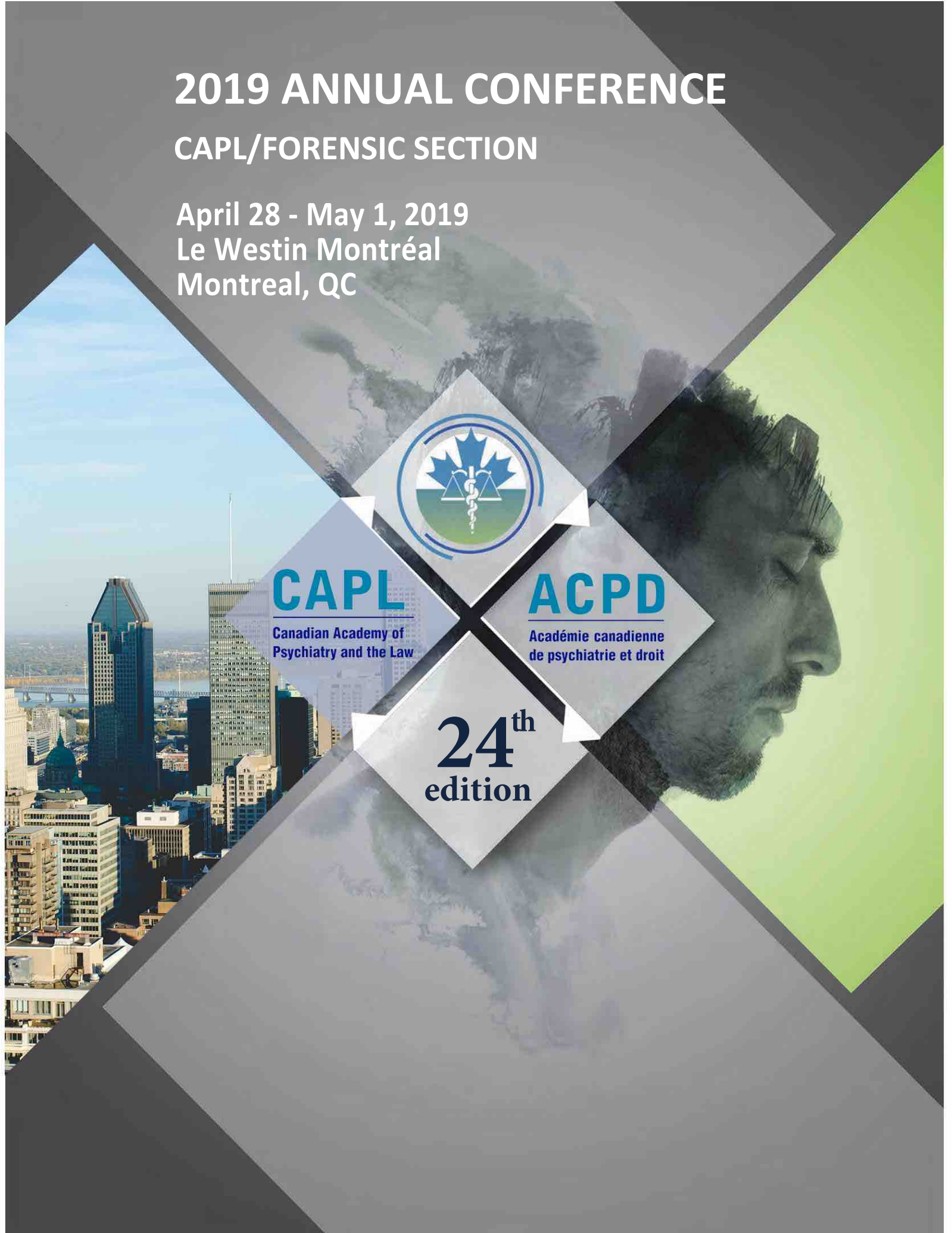

Throughout medicine, schizophrenia remains one of the most highly morbid conditions. With overlapping positive, negative and cognitive symptoms, frequently associated with severe behavioural, metabolic, and substance abuse consequences. It presents clinicians with an extraordinarily heterogeneous illness, with heterogeneous outcomes, and often despite heroic efforts.

While multidisciplinary, multimodal treatments are preferred for optimal treatment, very often that is not possible, leaving physicians to rely heavily on psychopharmacological interventions. Sadly, despite over 60 years of psychopharmacology, the treatment algorithm is devastatingly short, and no truly novel biological interventions are on the horizon. Even though treatment guidelines appear quite clear, the basic pharmacological approach to schizophrenia seems to be very highly and cryptically encoded, as patients with schizophrenia struggle to receive pharmacotherapy that is algorithmically derived.

Many patients experience an “anything but clozapine approach” and off-label treatment interventions before, and by definition, after, clozapine, and the consequences can be dire. The goal of this workshop is to crack the code of schizophrenia pharmacotherapy, and review the sentinel treatment discussions, decisions and how they are made before, during, and after clozapine.

1. Understand recent significant appellate decisions in forensic mental health law in 2018/2019 and their implications on forensic clinical practice.
2. Understand implications of recent appellate case law on presentation of risk management and clinical evidence before provincial Review Boards.
3. In light of recent trends and themes in appellate decisions, understand whether forensic psychiatric assessments on significant threat is under “judicial attack”, with particular attention to Ontario Court of Appeal decisions granting absolute discharges and ordering independent assessments.

This pre-conference workshop will review Canadian appellate cases from 2018 to 2019 dealing with appeals from Review Boards. Key cases will be summarized together with their practical implications for forensic hospitals and psychiatric practice.. The volume of appeals on a per province basis will be compared, together with implications for practice. Due to the higher level of appellate activity in Ontario (50 2018 ONCA decisions), the cases will largely come from Ontario, although recent appellate cases from other provinces (available as of the Conference date) will be discussed. Recurring themes and trends will be identified and discussed, including:

- appellate courts overturning Review Board decisions to grant absolute discharges – appellate decisions post Re Wall and Re Pellett and the implications for presenting evidence on significant threat at Review Board hearings;
- the treatment of substance use or abuse as an indicia of significant threat;
- restrictions of liberties – subsequent applications of ONCA’s 2018 Re Campbell decision;
- treatment impasses and Review Board obligations to order independent assessments;
- evaluation of civil mechanisms for detention as appropriate risk mitigation;
- procedural fairness and Charter issues at a Review Board hearing.

Time will be allowed for questions and discussion. A casebook containing recent case summaries with links to decided cases will be provided.
