

Learning Objectives:

Description:

Forensic clinical sexology is a core subspecialty within forensic psychiatry, as sexual offenders are a part of all forensic mental health services. This pre-conference seminar aims to provide a practical overview on the assessment and treatment of sexual offenders. The PCS features Dr. Patrick Lussier and his voluminous research on sex offender recidivism over time, which raises important questions about use of sex offender recidivism instruments. In light of this research, forensic psychiatrists may need to re-examine risk communication in sex offender assessment.

Bio - Patrick Lussier, PhD

Patrick Lussier is Professor at the School of Social Work and Criminology at Université Laval, in Quebec City, Canada. Dr. Lussier was previously a Professor at the School of Criminology at Simon Fraser University. He has been involved in research for over 20 years and has more than 170 publications on topics such as criminological theory of crime, risk assessment and risk management, criminal careers and offending trajectories, developmental criminology, and sexual offending over the life course. His work has been published in academic journals such as *Criminology, Criminal Justice and Behavior, Journal of Criminal Justice, Justice Quarterly, Journal of Quantitative Criminology, and Sexual Abuse.* Dr. Lussier is the Editor-in-Chief of the *Canadian Journal of Criminology and Criminal Justice.* He recently co-authored, with Dr. Evan McCuish (Simon Fraser University) and Dr. Jesse Cale (Griffith University), the book entitled *Understanding sexual offending: An evidence-based response to myths and misconceptions* (Springer, 2021)
